FREE SPEECH

UAP representatives in attendance at a Coalition meeting last quarter were interested to hear the latest brainstorm of the "free speech" crowd. Jodie O'Connell proposed a number of "election reforms" to enable the Coalition gang a chance to shut off information to the students and to aid coalition in the coming election. Political parties will be "entitled" to unlimited printing by the University, with the cost to be borne by the students. PIRG TRIES AGAIN

Unfortunately, the UAP must take notice that the G-PIRG fraud still stalks the campus. This is understandable since the paid organizers (like Rob Bildner) have a definite financial interest in the \$150,000 to be ripped off from the students here. You might even say that their jobs depend on it.

The latest disclosures about this fraud were made at a recent meeting at which Bildner announced that the University would be allowed only 4 votes on the state board, which would control all the money. Agnes Scott College, with only 400 students, along with every other small school, would be allowed one vote. This means that five small schools, contributing less than 18 as much as the University, will be able to spend our money for their benefit, even if it is against our interests. This is a perfect way for the small, private and black colleges to rape the University's student resources for their own purposes.

Furthermore, it is clear from the PIRG by-laws shown our reporter that not even the local board will be elected by University students. Article III, Section I on Local Boards reads as follows: "Students at each participating institution shall select a local G-PIRG board. The size, organization, officers, and procedures of each board shall be decided upon by local board members., consistent with article of incorporation and its by-laws."

Apparently a self-appointed local board decides on its own "size, organization, officers and procedures." One wonders what is left for the students to select.

This typical example of PIRG double-talk never mentions the word "election."

These facts can't be found in the PIRG publications, or in their petitions, and PIRG organizers mgiht even deny that they exist. However, Red and Black reporter Artie Bennett has a copy of the bylaws and also attended the meeting at which these facts were discovered.

If your name is already on the PIRG petition, try and get them to take it off. You'll find this as easy as controling your money once PIRG has got it, or trying to collect that refund they promise.
