## **Attempt by Jews to Murder Commander Fails**

An attempt to assassinate Commander Koehl and other American National Socialists failed in June because of the incompetence of the would-be murders. The assassination tries were made by way of parcel bombs sent to the Commander and other National Socialists through the mail.

The bomb mailed to the Commander was contained in a cigar box, which included gunpowder, a can of butane and a primitive firing mechanism. The parcel bomb was wrapped in brown paper and bore a New York City postmark and a New Jersey return address.

The murder attempt misfired when one of the senders of the bomb telephoned Party National Headquarters and bragged about it to Comrade Martin Kerr—before the bomb had arrived.

The Party immediately notified postal authorities, who discovered the bomb in the main post office in Arlington. It was detonated by army demolitions experts in a controlled explosion, and no one was injured. The remnants of the bomb are being held by postal authorities for investigative purposes.

A similar bomb was received by the Party's mail order department in Cicero, Ill., three days earlier. Also contained in a cigar box, that bomb included a pound of black powder, ball bearings and a jar of nails. NS Publications Manager Randy Shirk reports that the package was partially opened before it was determined that there was an explosive device inside.

Despite being partially opened, the bomb did not go off. It was also turned over to postal authorities.

In addition to the parcel bombs sent to Arlington and Cicero, bombs were sent to former Russian SS officer Tscherim Soobzokov, and two splinter-group leaders. All three of these bombs were also recovered by postal authorities before anyone was injured.

Individuals claiming to represent two different radical Jewish groups telephoned the newsmedia to claim responsibility for the bombs. One individual said that he represented the Jewish Action Movement. The other caller said that the bombs were sent by the Manhattan-based International Committee Against Nazism. (A spokesman for the committee later denied that his group had anything to do with the assassination attempts.) The caller who spoke to WHITE POWER editor Martin Kerr said that he represented the Jewish Armed Resistance.

One of the callers also indicated that the bombs had also been sent to the Party unit in El Monte, Calif., and to an official of a German-American group in Englewood, N.J., but no such bombs were ever discovered.

Less than two weeks after the parcel bombs were received, a Jewish terrorist attempted to murder Boleslavs Maikovskis, in Mineola, N.Y. Maikovskis has been declared a "war criminal" by the newsmedia for fighting against the Soviet Union during the Second World War, despite the fact that he has never been tried and convicted before an impartial judge and jury. This murder attempt was unsuccessful, too, when the Jew in question attacked the wrong person, and then failed to kill him.

In another telephone call to the media, a man claiming to represent the Jewish Executioners With Silence took credit for the attack. He also said that his group was responsible for sending the parcel bombs to the Commander and the others. He further stated that more bombs were already on the way, but over a month later, no more bombs had been received.

It is believed that the Jewish Executioners With Silence, the Jewish Armed Resistance, the Jewish Action Movement and the New Jewish Defense League are simply different names for the same small group of terrorists which has broken away from the Jewish Defense League.

In Arlington, Commander Koehl said that the mail bombs would not hinder the Party's operations in any way, and that special precautionary measures are now being added to the Party's already tight security procedures at National Headquarters to insure that no such attempts are successful in the future.

# Mail Bomb Discovered In Arlington

ARLINGTON—Postal authorities here Monday found a bomb in a package addressed to the leader of

the National Socialist White People's Party, a neo-Nazi group headquartered in Arlington.

Postal officials called in an Army Explosive Ordnance

Disposal Unit, which photographed the device with X-ray film and then used a special device to detonate it beside a loading dock in the rear of the building. While postal

officials would not comment on the construction of the device, a butane can, black powder, batteries and wire were found. The controlled blast by the bomb squad scattered

debris, including shards of wood, nails and packaging, in a 60-foot area.

A caller to United Press International said the militant Jewish Action Movement took responsibility for the bomb.

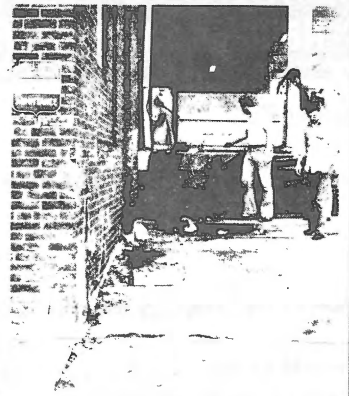

An anonymous male caller who said he was "from the International Committee Against Nazism" telephoned the New York offices of the Associated Press yesterday, warning that mail bombs had been sent "to Nazi war criminals across the United States."

The caller said the first bomb was sent to the Paterson, N.J. home of Tscherm Sobczok, a former Nazi SS officer who was cleared last month of war crime charges by a federal grand jury. Sobczok received a bomb.

Army bomb experts yesterday detonated a mailed bomb addressed to a local neo-Nazi Party leader after a group calling itself the Jewish Action Movement claimed responsibility for mailing at least three small bombs to neo-Nazi leaders here, in New York and in Cicero, Ill.

## Bombs Found in 3 States Linked to Anti-Nazi Group

An anti-Nazi group that has claimed responsibility for powerful parcel bombs discovered in New Jersey, Illinois and Nebraska promised "yesterday that 'more are on the way.'"

The police said bombs had been received in the mail by a Nebraska man connected with a German neo-Nazi group, a former Nazi SS officer living in Paterson, N.J., and a branch office of the National Socialist White People's Party in Cicero, Ill.

Bomb squad personnel in Chicago inspected a package being held at a post office branch there for Frank Collin, head of the National Socialist Party of America.

## 'Jewish Vigilantes Responsible' For Nazi Mail Bombs, Stabbing

MINEOLA, N.Y. (AP) — A group of self-described Jewish vigilantes who said they mailed bombs to suspected Nazi sympathizers last week have claimed responsibility for stabbing a 70-year-old man they thought was a Nazi war criminal.

"This is only the beginning," a man who identified himself as a member of Jewish Executioners With Silence (JEWS) warned in a telephone call to a radio station after Wednesday's stabbing.

The caller said the attack on Alexander Gordin, 70, of the Bronx, was

## Jewish Group Says It Sent Bombs

NEW YORK (UPI) — A group calling itself the Jewish Action Movement and saying "the only rights Nazis have is for burial" yesterday received Friday by Tscherm Sobczok, a former Nazi SS officer, a parcel bomb mailed to neo-Nazi leaders and former SS officer during World War II. The bomb was taken by police.

The group claimed it sent a package-bomb to Gerhard Lauck, a member of the German and American Nazi parties; one to a Nazi group in Arlington, Va., and another to a neo-Nazi group in Cicero, Ill., Saturday.

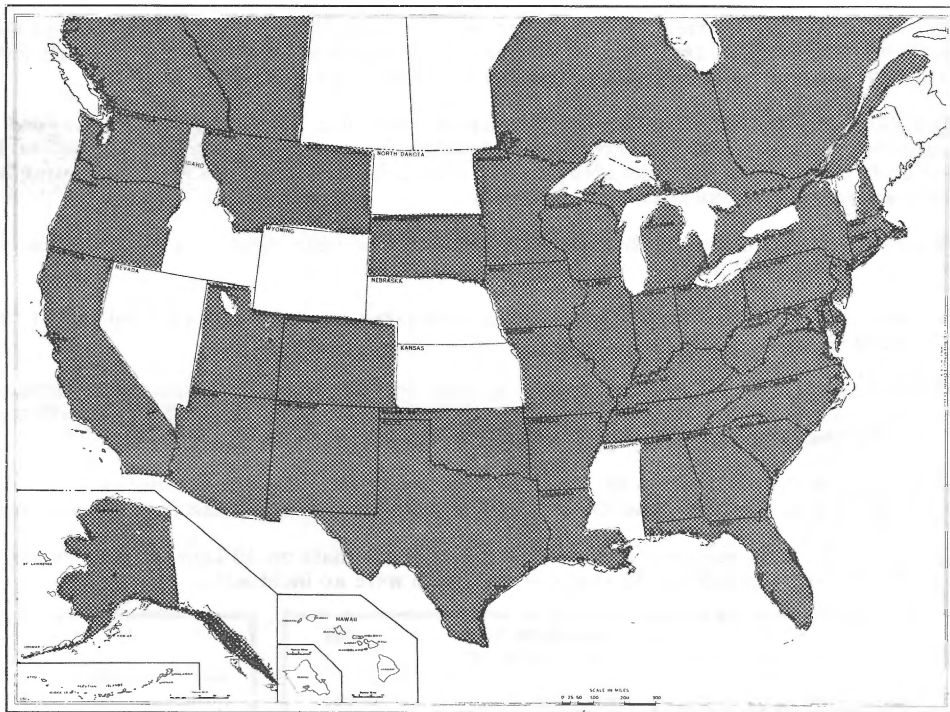
# 'Springtime for Hitler' Campaign Falls Short

The Party's 1979 Spring appeal, entitled "Springtime for Hitler" fell short of its mark by just under \$1,800, according to a report submitted to the Commander by Party Business Manager Rick Cooper. A total of \$7,288.39 was raised during the drive. The goal was \$9,000.

National Socialist comrades in 40 states, four Canadian provinces and one foreign country contributed to the campaign, which began on 20 April and ran through 31 May.

The Commander thanks those comrades who donated to the appeal, and especially those comrades who donated several times. "If everyone in the Party followed their praiseworthy example, we would have not only met our goal, but would have exceeded it by thousands of dollars," the Commander said.

Business Manager Cooper called the showing "disappointing," and indicated that the failure to raise the whole amount would mean that there would have to be a slight cut-back in Party operations over the next few months.

"We badly need the funds raised during these appeals if we are to maintain our present operations and continue to expand them," said Comrade Cooper. "Even though we fell short by less than \$2,000, we must now scrap several special projects we had tentatively planned for the Summer and Fall.

"Evidently there are some people who call themselves 'National Socialists' who really aren't too interested in whether this Movement succeeds or fails," he continued.

Comrade Cooper, who is also serving as the Party's Membership Secretary temporarily, said that National Headquarters is preparing to "purge" those supporters and members who have fallen way behind on their pledge or dues payments, or who have shown a gross lack of enthusiasm in spreading the good word of National Socialism and helping the Party to grow.

"Such needless baggage only serves to waste valuable Party time and resources, while adding nothing to the struggle for White Power and a National Socialist America," he said.

"We would rather have a small Party of doers, than a larger Party of talkers. We need activists, not inactivists," Comrade Cooper concluded.

## Midwest National Socialists Blitz Birch Society Meeting

Party comrades from Chicago and Milwaukee, under the command of Midwest Regional Leader Cedric Syrdahl, conducted a special literature distribution at the National Council Dinner of the John Birch Society on 9 June. Some 900 Birchers had paid \$25 a head to hear Robert Welch, aging leader of the ultra-rightwing group, and others speak in the posh Hyatt-Regency Hotel in downtown Chicago.

Appearing out of uniform, lest the Birchers die of fright, the National Socialists distributed a specially-prepared 64-page booklet to those entering the dining area. The booklet was designed to appeal to the finely honed Bircher sense of conspiracy. It also dispelled numerous rightwing misconceptions about the Party, explained what National Socialism is and revealed the tremendous influence the Jews have in the Federal government.

At one point the JBS leadership attempted to have the National Socialists ejected from the building. A half-dozen Birchers in tuxedos and ruffled shirts, brandishing cocktails, approached Capt. Syrdahl and told him that if the National Socialists did not leave at once they would be "forced to take action."

As the National Socialists were not scared off by this stiff threat, the Birchers proceeded to "take action": they called the police. After observing the situation, the police decided that no law was being violated, and did not bother the comrades.

Several hundred of the booklets were distributed during the course of the evening, and there were no further incidents.



# ACTIVITIES IN BRIEF

- Commander Koehl's editorial "No, We Are NOT Rightwingers!" was reprinted in the June issue of the rightwing *Southern Libertarian Messenger*, along with the Party's address.
- Two teams of uniformed ST men distributed over 200 copies of WHITE POWER to interested Whites in Olde Town Alexandria on 9 June. On 13 June, two teams of National Socialists wearing White Power T-shirts distributed 250 copies of the Party paper to rush hour commuters at the Rosslyn subway station in Arlington.
- A double picket was conducted by Minneapolis comrades on 23 June. Five uniformed National Socialists first picketed a fund-raising luncheon at which Vice President Walter Mondale was appearing. The VP was startled by the appearance of the National Socialists. Afterwards, the comrades picketed a local Socialist Worker's Party bookstore. There were no incidents. Some media coverage was received on both demonstrations.
- A routine "sticker action" by a member of the Richard Biederman Unit in Shakopee, Minn., resulted in some local newspaper coverage, reproduced here.
- Party comrades in Chicago, Indianapolis, Milwaukee, Portland and St. Paul report conducting organized WHITE POWER distributions during the month of June.
- Indianapolis activist Paul Gardner gave an interview on the Party to Channel 6 television on 28 June. The interview was aired for two successive nights on the news. Earlier in the month, Comrade Gardner was interviewed at great length by the *Indianapolis Star News*—but the interview was never printed.
- In addition to conducting a literature distribution at the John Birch Society dinner, Midwest comrades also held a uniformed paper sale in Chicago on 9 June. Over \$18.00 was collected in donations in little more than an hour.
- Los Angeles Unit members picketed the local CBS affiliate on 30 June, to protest the continuous airing of anti-White, anti-National Socialist broadcasts by that station. There were no incidents.

**Socialist Workers Party office picketed by Nazis**

Four uniformed Nazis picketed the St. Paul headquarters of the Socialist Workers Party Saturday afternoon, a party official said.

Jim Kendrick, a member of the party's executive committee, said the men were wearing boots, brown shirts with swastika armbands, brown trousers and white helmets.

They carried signs saying "A good Red is a dead Red," he said.

An official at St. Paul police headquarters said officers reported no trouble at the scene, 373 University Av.

Kendrick said that the Nazis didn't prevent anyone from entering the party headquarters and its bookstore, which is only open on Saturdays, but that they insulted a black woman passerby.
