Party Wins Important Victory Against Cleveland Anti-Swastika Ban!

On Monday, 15 January, a federal judge in Cleveland struck down the arbitrary and unconstitutional anti-Swastika ban being enforced at City Council meetings. The judge, Thomas D. Lambros, declared that "the Supreme Court of the United States has said the right to wear armbands is protected by the First Amendment." Commander Koehl had gone to Cleveland to assist local organizer Casey Kalembe in the suit.

The decision was the result of legal action initiated by Comrade Kalembe when he was physically denied entrance to the City Council meetings last November because of the Aryan Cross insignia on his armband. Kalembe and several other comrades have attended such meetings for almost a year, in uniform.

The City Council President, Edmund Turk, had originally imposed the arbitrary ban against the presence of the Swastika in the City Council hearings.

After Judge Lambros' decision, GL Kalembe appeared at the next City Council meeting, but was denied entrance into the City Hall, where the meeting convened, by Cleveland mayor Ralph J. Perk, who claimed that the judge only ruled that the Aryan Cross was allowed in the City Council chambers, but said nothing about it being allowed in the City Hall.

Perk's open defiance aroused a storm of controversy, most observers agreeing that the Party was within its rights. Councilmen and members of the Fraternal Order of Police both urged the spiteful mayor to recognize the law and abandon his obstruction of the right of National Socialists to attend their local City Council meetings.

Upon hearing of Mayor Perk's open defiance of his decision, Judge Lambros threatened to provide the National Socialists with an escort of federal marshals and to prosecute anyone who attempted to obstruct them. Mayor Perk backed down, and withdrew his order to arrest anyone wearing a Swastika in City Hall.

GL Kalembe crowned the victory by entering City Hall in full uniform, accompanied by his attorney and a National Socialist escort. This set an important precedent in the Party's struggle to assert its political rights and it also hallmarked the Cleveland unit's growing influence in the community.

Mayor to defy ruling on wearing swastika

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP) — Cleveland Mayor Ralph J. Perk, defying a federal court order, said he'll bar persons wearing swastikas—symbol of the Nazi Party—from entering City Hall.

Judge Thomas Lambros ruled Monday in favor of the American Civil Liberties Union and its allies who sued to have persons who wear swastika armbands admitted to city council meetings.

But Perk said Tuesday that anyone wearing a swastika armband will be prevented from entering City Hall because we deplore what that stands for.

"The federal court has ruled the swastika armband may be worn in council chambers, but as far as we can determine, the court has not ruled they can enter City Hall," said Perk. "I don't feel I'll be violating the court's order."

Perk said he has not discussed his decision with the law department and that he has ordered the safety department to enforce his order.

Lambros said he decided in behalf of the ACLU because the U.S. Supreme Court has said the right to wear armbands is protected by the First Amendment.

Attorney Benjamin Sheerer who argued the case for the ACLU said he was startled by Perk's order. "The ACLU took up the case for the Cleveland chapter of the National Socialist White People's party, otherwise known as the American Nazi party."

Perk's swastika ban risks suit

The American Civil Liberties Union says it will sue again in Federal court if Mayor Perk bars anyone wearing swastika armbands from entering City Hall.

"I think the mayor had better consult with his law department before he gets himself into trouble," said Benjamin B. Sheerer, chairman of the Cleveland ACLU chapter and the man who argued another swastika case.

"I think the new law director, Herbert Whiting, will tell the mayor what he is getting into when he fools around with a federal judge," Sheerer said.

THE MAYOR declared at a late afternoon news conference yesterday that the Safety Department has been instructed to prohibit anyone wearing the swastika, symbol of the Nazi party, from entering City Hall or City Council chambers.

Monday, Federal Judge Thomas D. Lambros ordered Council President Edmund J. Turk to allow persons wearing swastika armbands to be spectators at Council meetings.

Judge Lambros ruled that the right to wear armbands is protected by the First

Amendment right to free speech.

"AS FAR as I know, the court did not rule that they are permitted to enter City Hall," said Perk. "Therefore anyone wearing a swastika will be prohibited from coming into City Hall. We deplore what the swastika stands for."

Perk backs down on swastika policy

Mayor Ralph Perk has temporarily backed down on his order made Tuesday to bar all persons from City Hall wearing swastika armbands.

The city will try instead to formulate an ordinance banning "all forms of symbolic speech that tend to incite people to unlawful or violent conduct," says Law Director Herbert Whiting.

"No one will be barred from City Hall wearing a swastika armband before Council takes action on the ordinance," said Whiting who is acting mayor while Perk is in Washington for the inauguration.

"I'm certainly not going to do anything while I'm in charge," the law director said.

A Press reporter was escorted by police from City Hall after a confrontation with the mayor. According to Whiting, that won't happen again. The city will use the courts.

Drawing up an ordinance that is constitutional and stays outside the scope of Federal Judge Thomas Lambros' recent ruling on swastikas has presented prob-

lems for the law department.

At least three different drafts of a prohibiting ordinance, backed by the Mayor and Council President Edmund Turk, have been discarded.

"No action will be taken that violates free speech provisions," Whiting said.

Moratorium Also Strikes Suburbs

\$23 Million in Subsidized Housing Frozen Here

Nearly \$23 million in proposed housing construction in Cleveland has been frozen because of the Nixon administration's moratorium on federally subsidized housing programs, Federal Housing Administration records show.

Examination of FHA records discloses that planning of at least nine projects involving 1,289 new housing units in the city has come to a halt because of the 18-month moratorium.

The FHA records also show building of 2,971 housing units in the suburbs at a cost of \$68.7 million are also affected by the moratorium.

Not included in the city moratorium is \$47.8 million in construction of 2,776 housing units. These are projects already approved by FHA. Normal planning for federally subsidized housing projects takes about a year.

BECAUSE OF A time lag in planning, John A. Kasulatis, an FHA underwriter, said he does not anticipate a substantial reduction in subsidized housing in the next year.

The moratorium, however, was assailed yesterday by builders and trade spokesmen as disastrous.

The City Planning Commission estimates the city has 50,000

ing units and 27,000 housing units overcrowded in deteriorating inner-city neighborhoods.

The Cleveland Building & Construction Trades Council estimated the moratorium on federally subsidized housing projects in the city and suburbs could result in loss of 4,000 construction jobs.

Jay C. Ehle, president of Cleveland Builders Supply Co., said the moratorium would have a decided effect on the economy. He said he could not, however, fore- financial effects on firms supplying materials for construction.

SPITE A SURGE in downtown construction, Cleveland, the nation's eighth

largest market, ranks 37th in the amount of construction starts.

Even Topeka, Kan., ranks higher than Cleveland, according to Ehle.

Hit hard are inner-city development corporations such as the Hough Area Development Corp. (HADC) and major developers such as Associated Estates Corp., headed by Carl Milstein.

Milstein estimated 30% of this \$50 million a year development business was relying on federally subsidized housing programs.

He estimated Associated Estates has \$35 million worth of federally subsidized

housing projects that were being planned in Greater Cleveland and outside Ohio.

"WE ASSUME THESE are affected," he said.

Milstein said to keep the projects alive Associated Estates would have to revert to conventional bank financing.

Such financing, however, will mean higher costs to developers in interest payments on construction loans. For consumers it means higher rents. The federally subsidized housing programs have lower interest rates.

Wiped out for HADC are two projects involving 600 new housing units in the

Right to wear swastikas upheld by district court

CLEVELAND (AP)—Always pleased when I see the Jewish lawyer who helped prosecute the case of the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) filed suit on behalf of the National Socialist White People's Party (NSWPP) after the court ruled that the party's right to wear swastikas in its uniforms was upheld by a federal judge yesterday.

The judge, U.S. District Court Judge John J. Sirica, ruled in favor of the NSWPP in a case that had been pending for several months. The party, which is based in Cleveland, had argued that the First Amendment protects its right to wear swastikas as part of its uniform.

The judge's ruling came after the ACLU had argued that the swastika is a symbol of hate and that its use in a uniform is a violation of public order. The judge rejected the ACLU's argument, stating that the swastika is a symbol of good luck and that its use in a uniform is a matter of personal expression.

Forget swastikas, mayor

Mayor Perk is blowing the Nazi swastika armband issue all out of proportion.

Earlier this week Federal Judge Thomas D. Lambros ruled that spectators wearing swastika armbands could not be prohibited from attending Cleveland Council meetings.

The mayor's bristling reaction to that was an order that no one can wear a swastika armband in City Hall.

What Judge Lambros was saying, in ef-

fect, is that no matter how unpopular or repugnant an ideology may be, a person still has a right to espouse it, by word or symbol. And the judge is right. This is, after all, a democracy, and a strong enough one to survive sideshows put on by crackpot extremists.

By trying to draw up legislation to ban swastika armbands, Perk is giving this whole silly business more attention than it deserves. Just forget it, mayor, and it will all blow away.

Swastika Is Allowed at Council Meetings

A federal judge whose oldest brother was shot down by Nazi gunfire in World War II yesterday allowed the swastika to be worn by spectators at Cleveland City Council meetings.

"This court is mindful that the issues in this case raise many emotional aspects," said U.S. District Judge Thomas D. Lambros. "This court is mindful that the swastika is the sign of the Nazi party of Adolph Hitler.

"This court is mindful... of the furnaces where millions of Jews were burned.

"But this court is also mindful that the Supreme Court of the United States has said the right to wear armbands is protected by the First Amendment."

THE JUDGE'S brother, the late Peter Lambros, was a tail gunner on an Army aircraft in World War II, was shot down and missing in action over Austria in 1945. Two other brothers served in the armed forces in the war.

Judge Lambros said the issue was not whether the

views of the National Socialist White People's party, otherwise known as the American Nazi party, were "consistent with the policies of this nation."

Rather, the judge said, the right of a minority group to express an unpopular belief was at stake.

Members of the party wear brown military shirts, black pants and ties and red armbands with a black swastika in a white circle—garb similar to that of Nazis in Germany before and during World War II.

The Cleveland chapter of the group, headed by Kazimer Kalemba, was barred from attending City Council meetings while wearing the armbands by Council President Edmund J. Turk, D-23. The American Civil Liberties Union then sued.

The hearing yesterday lasted all day and the ruling came at 6 p.m.

TURK AND OTHER councilmen testified that they were upset and distracted by the presence of swastikas in council chambers.

"I'm sure that after their presence with swastikas was no longer novel that feeling would not run as high," Judge Lambros said.

Benjamin B. Sheerer of the ACLU argued that the armbands represented speech, but not disruptive action in council chambers. Assistant City Law Director Wayne C. Dabb Jr. argued that council prohibits banners and signs at council meetings.

Attending the hearing were four other party members, including the national commander, Matt Koehl, the successor to the late George Lincoln Rockwell. Also in attendance were four Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, in black shirts, trousers and ties with four Ks on them.

Cleveland Mayor Fighting Order on Nazi Armbands

CLEVELAND, Jan. 20—Members of the National Socialist White People's party, also known as the American Nazi party, have won a Federal Court order permitting them to wear swastika armbands while attending Cleveland City Council meetings. But getting to the meetings is a different problem.

The council meets Monday evenings on the second floor of City Hall. Mayor Ralph J. Perk is interpreting the court order strictly, to apply only to the council chamber, and wants persons wearing swastika armbands in the lobby or corridors of City Hall escorted from the building.

But City Councilmen who do not like the court order also do not think the Mayor's proposed action proper.

Last year members of the party attended a council meeting in their uniforms, including President Edmund J. Turk, who ordered them ejected from the meeting, and barred them from attending any further meetings while in uniform.

The party, which was represented by lawyers from the American Civil Liberties Union,

filed suit in United States District Court here, contending the ouster and banning were violations of the right to free speech.

Attorneys for the A.C.L.U. and the city argued the merits of the case last Monday.

"This court is mindful that the issues in this case raise nearly emotional issues," said Judge Thomas D. Lambros. Reporter Ejected

Judge Lambros, who had three brothers serving in the United States armed forces during World War II, including one shot down in action while flying over Germany, said the issue before the court was not the views of the party but the right of a minority group to express an unpopular opinion.

When word of the judge's decision Monday reached City Hall, Mayor Perk said any person wearing a swastika armband in City Hall would be escorted out of the building. The

City officials have said an appeal of Judge Lambros's ruling would be filed as soon as possible. In addition city lawyers were drawing up a proposed ordinance to bar all types of "symbolic speech" at council meetings. Banners and signs currently are prohibited.

Until the appeal is heard, or the ordinances passed, a spokesman for the Mayor said the decision banning swastikas from City Hall would not be enforced.

Perk's ban on the swastika draws McFaul, police fire

Mayor Perk's ban on Nazi armbands in City Hall drew strong criticism today from downtown Councilman Gerald McFaul and the Fraternal Order of Police President Richard Farragher.

McFaul called on the mayor to rescind the order, adding, "He must think he knows more than a federal judge."

Farragher has asked the Law Department to put the mayor's order in writing so that city police will not be "caught in the middle between Mayor Perk and a federal judge."

THE MAYOR DECLARED two days ago that the Safety Department has been instructed to prohibit anyone wearing the swastika from entering City Hall or City Council chambers.

The order came just one day after Federal Judge Thomas D. Lambros ordered Council President Edmund J. Turk to allow swastika armbands to be worn by spectators at Council meetings.

"Is this mayor so naive or stupid to

think he can successfully bar the Nazis from City Hall?" asked McFaul. "How does he think they are going to get into the Council chambers, through a hole in the roof?"

"I HATE THE NAZIS too, and I'd like to punch them all in the mouth, but we have to follow the court order," he added.

Farragher said today he was assured by an assistant law director that the mayor's order will be reduced to writing early next week after city lawyers have a chance to study Judge Lambros' written ruling.

Judge Lambros is expected to release the written version of his oral ruling sometime today.

Law Director Herbert R. Whiting said that the FOP has not asked him to put the mayor's order in writing. He added he saw no reason to do it "because the mayor is the boss, and it would be a hell of a way to run a city if the FOP demands every order the mayor makes in writing."

The Cleveland NSWPP has been increasingly in the news in recent months, and the federal ruling has made quite a few waves there. The area is expected to be a prime center for Party activity in the near future.

Wisconsin Council Meeting Gets Taste of National Socialism

On 15 January Scott Mosby, of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, attended a local council meeting in near-by Whitefish Bay Village Hall.

Arriving shortly after the meeting commenced, Comrade Mosby took his seat. Before long, a number of the board members were looking in his direction, staring at his Swastika armband, and angrily gesticulating at one another, at a loss for what to do.

After a few moments of whisipers, hostile glares, and the like, a "village trustee" approached Comrade Mosby and indicated he wished to speak with him in the hall. Once in the hall, the "trustee" frantically urged the National Socialist to shed his Aryan Cross armband. But to no avail—the Swastika remained.

The "trustee" quickly re-entered the council room, adding further to the commotion. Comrade Mosby re-took his seat and, despite the anxious whimpers of the pallid parliamentarians, remained throughout the proceedings.
