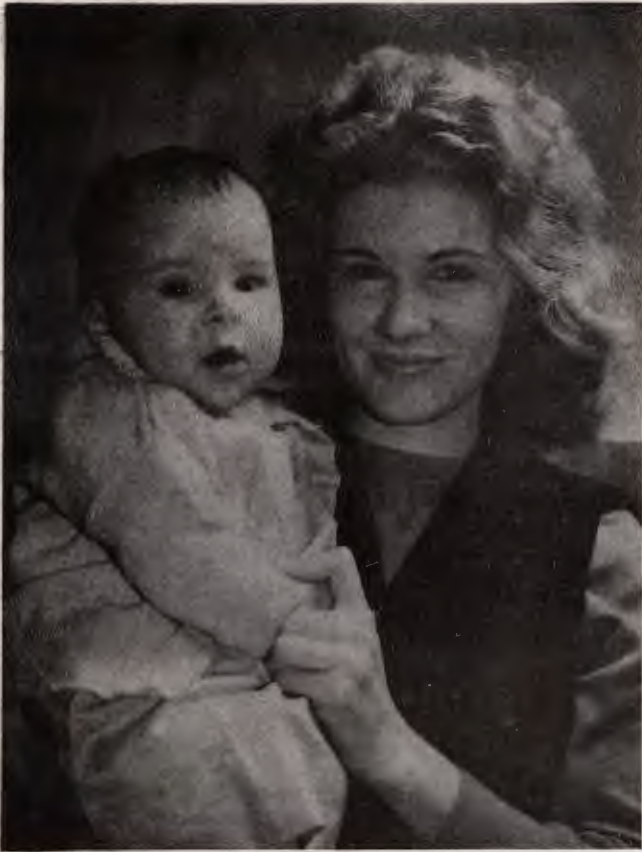


CIVIL RIGHTS - for WHO ?!?!



My name is Mrs. Robert Sharp, and this is my daughter, Charlotte. My husband, Bob, is in prison in Philadelphia.

When I was a kid in school, in Rockholds, Kentucky, they taught me this was a free country, --and I believed it!

But I don't any more!

After Bob and I were married, he went to work in a big mill. He had to join a union. But it was run by tough communists, and he got in a fight with one of the union goons. After that he couldn't work.

He was MAD! He wanted to fight the communists, and tried the local chapter of the Birch Society. But they were almost all over sixty and had money. Bob felt out of place. He had heard about the American Nazi Party and wrote off to get some of their literature. It scared me, but he was too mad to give a damn.

He got the Party Program and a letter from Commander Rockwell inviting him to come to Arlington. Bob read the Program and was surprised to find it was FOR the American Constitution, and did not advocate the overthrow of the government, but did advocate killing communist traitors according to the Constitution.

The Nazis claimed that communism was Jewish, and Bob remembered that almost all the spies and traitors like the Rosenbergs and Soblen WERE Jews. He also noticed most of the commie union bosses were Jews, and the guys who were pushing race-mixing were usually Cohens or Goldbergs or Finklesteins.

He knew the Nazis always got in hot water for mentioning the Jews, but, like I say, Bob was MAD! He didn't care!

One day he packed me and Charlotte off in our old Chevy and started for Arlington, Virginia, and Nazi Headquarters.

Commander Rockwell turned out to be a pretty nice guy, -not at all the monster we expected. He showed us his war-decorations, his honorable discharge from the Navy, the legal charter of the Nazi Party, hundreds of clippings of fights he and his men had been in with commies all over America and even in England, and he introduced us to dozens of young American Storm Troopers, just like Bob!

That did it! Bob asked to join on the spot, and began to learn the science of race,, American history, law, hand-to-hand defense and combat and all the other things a Storm Trooper has to know.

Most of all, Commander Rockwell drummed into Bob and all the rest respect for the law and a belief that we can still save our nation and race by legal methods, providing we were willing to go out into the streets and fight for the rights of the White Race and the American Republic just the same way the Jews and reds have picketed and used sit-ins and similar aggressive methods to push us out.

The Commander pointed out that the NAACP, led by the Jew, Arthur Spingarn, got a Court Order to get a nigger into the University of Mississippi, even though the NAACP, the Courts and everybody else knew damned well it would cause bloody riots and maybe even deaths. But since it was on a Court's order, no matter how wrong, Commander Rockwell wouldn't let us interfere or go down there. He stopped hundreds of armed men from going over to Oxford to kill that nigger, even though we all wanted to and believed it would be right. Five times the American Nazi Par-

ty had tried to picket red or race-mixing demonstrations in Philadelphia, and each time our men had been beaten or driven out by mobs like in Mississippi, only of Jews, in this case. Often our men were jailed and held without cause.

So we did just what Americans are supposed to do to enforce their rights, we went to the Federal Court in Philadelphia.

Gus Hall, the head of the treasonable Communist Party, was holding a big public speech in Philadelphia on Columbus-Day! --Imagine!

Judges Denies Police Squad For Nazi Chiefs

U. S. District Judge Allen K. Grim on Wednesday denied a request by three leaders of the American Nazi Party for police protection during anti-Communist demonstrations planned for 7:30 P. M. Friday in front of the Adelphia Hotel.

The three American Nazi Party officers, Karl R. Allen, Seth D. Ryan and Ralph P. Forbes, filed a petition for a writ of mandamus in the District Court on Tuesday against Police

Commissioner Albert N. Brown. The American Nazi Party, they said, will protest by "lawful picketing" the appearance of Gus Hall, Communist Party leader. They told the court that during previous demonstrations here they had not received proper police protection.

In denying their request, Judge Grim pointed out that the Supreme Court has abolished the action through which they were seeking the court order. He added that they had not proved that the Police Department went beyond its proper power in maintaining law and order in the streets.

Forbes, who took the stand during the hour-long hearing, described the organization as a candidates on the ballot for election in Virginia next year, and sometime later in Pennsylvania.

My husband and four other men volunteered to go up there and picket this arrogant communist treason. They made up signs saying "Communism is treason" and other similar signs you can read in the newspaper clippings.

My husband, Bob Sharp, and the other four brave men trying to picket the communist meeting were brutally attacked by a huge mob of Communist Jews and Jewish War Veterans. These Jews were standing quietly around the COMMUNIST speech, not bothering these traitors at all! But when our men appeared with their ANTI-Communist signs, 2,000 Jews and Commie goons screamed "KILL THEM!"

The police didn't take in a single one of the mobsters which made the attack!

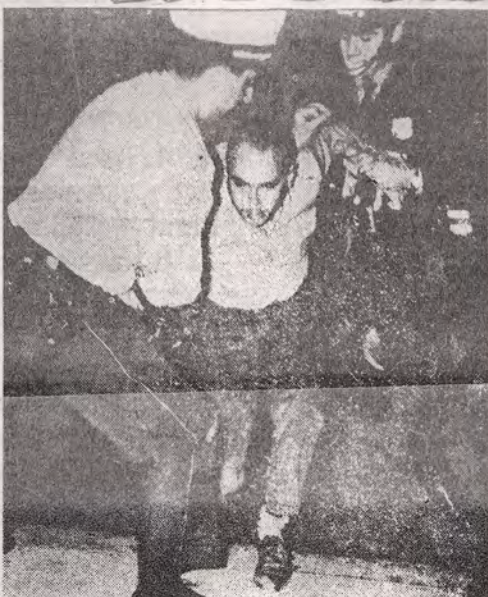

150 Cops Save 5 Nazis from Mob of 2,000

When the "storm troopers" drove up to 13th and Chestnut Sts. shortly before 7:30 o'clock last night, 150 cops and 2,000 muttering citizens were waiting for them. Hall, darling of the American Communist Party, meanwhile was spouting off inside the hotel that America's free enterprise system "was doomed."

The battle was joined and Police Commissioner Albert N. Brown and Chief Inspector Albert J. Trimmer were in the midst of it.

THE PUSHING, showing, wild punching went on for several minutes. A number of persons, including two cops, were knocked to the ground before the not-so-brave Nazis were loaded into a police wagon and whisked off to the 20th and Pennsylvania Ave. police station.

THE FIVE NAZIS, wearing swastika armbands, khaki uniforms and black jackboots, left their car on 13th St. and marched around the corner to Chestnut St., near the hotel's main entrance. They carried four picket signs, some of which read, "Karl Marx was a crackpot," "J. E. Hoover was right," "Communism is treason."

"Kill them," shouted hundreds massed on the south side of Chestnut St. across from the hotel. The mob began to press hard against a solid wall of cops. Six men managed to break through.

They dashed across the street, were stopped by a solid ring of cops around the cringing Nazis.

Three of the late citizens, one with his shirt torn off, were placed in a police car until they cooled off. Then they were released. Others were restrained—some with police headlocks—as they tried to move across Chestnut St.

"It's all over . . . let's all go home," Inspector Frank Rizzo urged the crowd.
